What is bone broth?

Bone broth is a nutrient-rich liquid made by slow-cooking meaty joint bones, which contain abundant connective tissue, in water with a small amount of apple cider vinegar. This process typically takes between 12 to 24 hours, allowing the breakdown of meat and sinew to release beneficial nutrients such as collagen, gelatin, glucosamine, chondroitin, minerals, amino acids, and acids.

Bones serve as the body's mineral storehouse, while connective tissue supplies essential nutrients for the growth and repair of elastic tissues.

Benefits

Bone broth offers essential nutrients for all dogs and cats, with particular benefits for those that are young and growing, senior, ill or recuperating, and those with digestive issues or joint injuries and pain.

Digestive and Immune System

Studies show that gelatin, derived from collagen, is highly beneficial for strengthening the gut lining, combating food sensitivities, promoting the growth of probiotics (beneficial bacteria) in the gut, and supporting healthy inflammation levels within the digestive tract. Enhanced gut health prevents poor digestion, which can cause the immune system to mistakenly identify foods as foreign invaders.

For sick or older dogs, bone broth offers easily digestible nutrients that can improve their overall well-being, keeping them nourished and hydrated. The increased palatability of bone broth encourages these dogs to consume more of their regular food, helping to replenish lost nutrients. Additionally, bone broth can aid in healing the gut of dogs and cats experiencing recurring or chronic diarrhea or vomiting.

Joint, Skin & Coat Health

Chondroitin and glucosamine are two essential nutrients that make bone broth particularly beneficial. These compounds are well-known for their ability to reduce inflammation, arthritis, and joint pain. This can be especially advantageous for senior dogs experiencing joint deterioration, small breed dogs with conditions like luxating patella (floating kneecap), and large breed dogs with hip problems. Glucosamine and chondroitin work synergistically with the gelatin and hyaluronic acid present in bone broth to lubricate, nourish, and strengthen your pet's bones and joints, as well as to moisturize and enhance the elasticity of the skin. The specific proteins found in bone broth are ideal for young, growing dogs, helping to ensure healthy joints and bones.

How to feed

To easily and effectively incorporate bone broth into your pet's diet, thaw a cube and pour it over their regular food. Alternatively, you can thaw it and allow your pet to drink it directly, as bone broth is highly palatable.
